### Pruning 101: For Happy and Healthy Trees

Pruning can help your woody plants survive adverse experiences or create a more beautiful shape that fits your property's space better. To prune successfully, you must look carefully and cut thoughtfully. Below you will find instructions on how and when to prune your woody plants in order to have a healthy plant that will continue to survive and thrive for many years to come.

#### Getting Started

Before any pruning can be done, make sure you have these tools:

1. Safety glasses and gloves - As always, while working with tools in the outdoors, gloves and safety glasses are highly recommended to reduce the risk of injury.
2. Pruning shears - Shears are an easy way to make cuts on small branches that are about 1/4 inch thick.
3. Small hand saw or long-handled loppers - Anything thicker than 1/4 inch thick requires a saw or long-handled loppers.

*Using the wrong tool, dull edges, or dirty blades can all result in the spread of disease or unnecessary damage to your plants.*

#### When to Prune

To know when to prune a plant, you should know when it flowers. If your tree or shrub blooms in the early spring, wait until after it is done flowering to prune, as the spring flowers will bloom on the growth from the previous year. Pruning too early results in fewer flowers and slower growth for that plant. (Continued on Page 2)

If your tree or shrub is a summer bloomer, prune in mid to late March before the buds break. This allows your plant to focus on creating new growth in your desired areas and prevents it from wasting its energy.

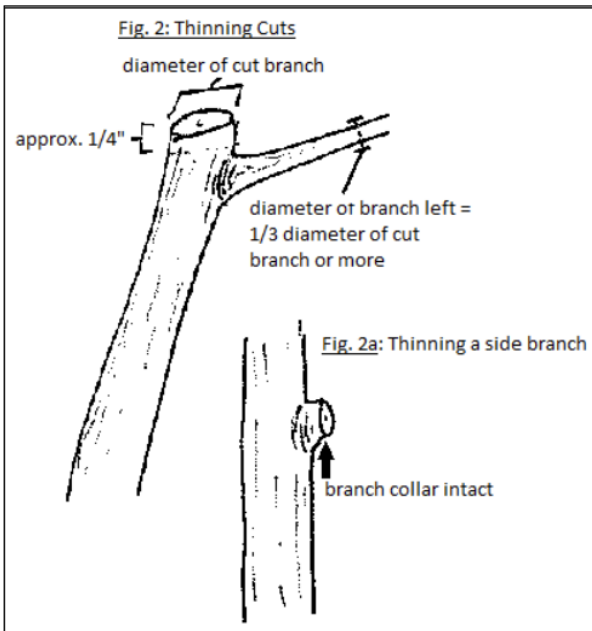
*Anything that is dead, damaged, or diseased should be pruned immediately, no matter the season.*

## What to Prune: Remember the Three D's and Two C's

**Dead, Damaged, Diseased** - Prune anything that looks blackened, cracked, shriveled, etc. Not sure if it's alive? Check the buds and bark: they may be shrunken, dry, or shriveled, and compare questionable parts with healthy parts. If you're still unsure, take a sharp knife and scrape away a tiny slice of bark from the branch. Any moist, green tissue means it's alive.

**Crossing, Crowded** - Prune branches that are crossing back through the center of the shrub or tree that are (or could be) rubbing against each other. Rubbing branches will damage each other. Use a reduction cut (remember, heading will cause more growth). Keep the branch that looks less likely to cause future problems and that you can bring back to a properly sized branch for reduction.

## How to Cut: Heading vs. Thinning



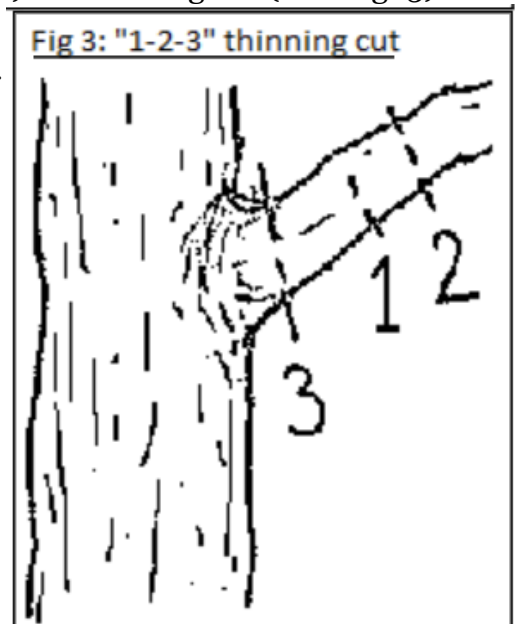
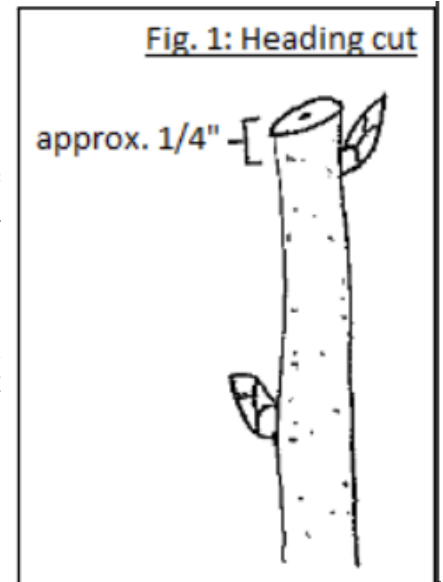
A **heading** cut (Fig. 1) is one made in the middle of a branch or twig, back to a bud, at 30° from straight across. This causes increased growth at the "head" of the cut. A common pruning mistake is trying to control the size of shrubs by making lots of cuts in the middle twigs as this causes a flush of growth right where you cut.

A **thinning** (or reduction) cut (Fig. 2) removes a twig or branch all the way back to another one. Always cut back to a branch with at least 1/3 the diameter of the one you're cutting (bigger is better). Note in Fig. 2a (and Fig. 3) that the cut is right after the branch collar, or swelling at the base of the old branch. The branch collar should always be left intact; cut too close and the plant will not heal, too

far out and the stump will rot back into the plant.

**Heavy Stuff**- On any branch that would be hard to hold easily in one hand, use the "1-2-3" cut (Fig. 3), partway up from the bottom. This will keep the bark you're keeping from ripping down from the cut.

By following this simple guide, you will be able to care for your woody plants and keep them happy and healthy for many years to come.

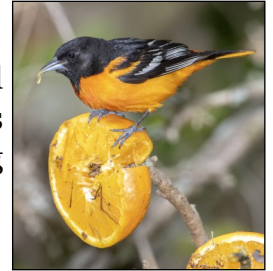
## Breakfast with the Birds

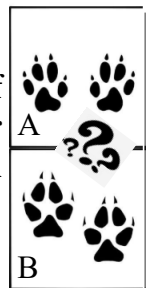
